#### Module aims

The aim of the module is to introduce students to the foundations of European and international 'legal' relations and how tensions between states are managed in international law

## Module Learning Outcomes - at the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Explain the EU constitution, the roles of the institutions in making law
2	Demonstrate an understanding of the evolving relationship between the UK and EU, the implications that arise from 'Brexit' in constitutional law and the contextual factors which shape developments
3	Demonstrate an understanding the modes of enforcement of EU law and the role of Court of Justice of the European Union in this process.

# **Learning and Teaching Strategies**

The learning and teaching strategy is grounded in the University's commitment to an Active Learning Framework (ALF) so that learning will be both accessible and active, and include
