Module aims

To develop students' legal skills and their abilities to understand and navigate the contextual, moral, ethical and professional backdrop of legal practice in England and Wales

Module Learning Outcomes - at the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Identify and demonstrate the key legal skills of interviewing; advocacy; mediation and persuading
2	Critically explore the nature of professionalism, and the ethical and professional frameworks to resolve dilemmas and manage the relationship between the individual legal practitioner, their client, the legal profession, and the legal system in England and Wales
3	Identify ethical issues that can arise in legal practice and show awareness of how these might be interpreted in light of their own individual values and ethical priorities

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

Students will receive a formal input on a key legal skill (interviewing; advocacy; mediation; mooting) or legal concern (ethics/professional standards) and then be directed towards additional reading/exemplar videos and to consider a particular case study/legal encounter in advance of the next session. In the subsequent session, in a small group, they will demonstrate the skill (or navigate the concern) in a short, recorded, 10 minute simulated encounter and receive feedback on the recording from their small group peers. The assessment will take the form of 5 x 500 word reflections on one's own performance and the feedback received from peers

Learning and teaching is facilitated alternately in whole group and then a small group learning sets.
