# **Module Aims:**

This module will establish the significance of research within health & social care practice. It aims to identify fundamental research concepts and methods used in health & social care and will enable the student to develop a critical understanding of research processes in order to enhance service user care and interventions.

- 3. Differentiate between qualitative and quantitative approaches to research, comparing and contrasting their relative merits and application to health & social care practice.
- 4. Analyse research findings and appraise the strengths and weaknesses of research studies in order to apply to current issues in service user care and interventions.
