Module Aims:

- 1. To enable social workers to critically reflect upon and evaluate their own accountability as a registered social worker in organisations delivering social work services.
- To provide a framework of constructive feedback to the social worker in order to improve critical reflection of accountability in increasingly complex social work cases

Expected Learning Outcomes

At the end of this module, students should be able to:

- 1. Critically reflect upon their experience of accountability in complex social work provision, articulating how evidence from supervision, mentoring, theory, research and legislation has informed this. (A3, B2,B3, C1,D1,D2)
- 2. Critically analyse their role in working with social work cases of increasing complexity within their employing organisation, managing any relevant ethical dilemmas and/or areas of ambiguity(A3,B1,B3,C1,D1)
- 3. Demonstrate a systematic understanding of their accountability for complex assessments and judgements made as a qualified social worker with reference to the appropriate legal and ethical framework (A1,A2,A3,B1,B3,C1,C2)
- 4. Communicate and justify the outcomes of complex social work assessments and decisions effectively to service users, their families and carers and relevant professional agencies.(A2,B1,B3,C1,C2,C3,D1,D3)

Portfolio consisting of 2 elements

- Essay: A critically reflective and evidence informed written account of the experience of accountability whilst working with a complex social work case. The account will explore tensions and challenges where relevant, justify decisions and actions taken and should be supported by and cross referenced to evidence contained within their portfolio.
- 2) Portfolio: A Portfolio which provides appropriate and succinct evidence of achievement of learning outcomes 3 and 4 in practice. This must include a relevant observation record written and signed by the student's assessor. Other evidence can be selected and submitted by the student as desired to support the demonstration of outcomes and can be taken from the 12 months practice previous to the start of as well as during the module. The Portfolio will be jointly assessed by the module tutor and student's assessor.

Both elements of assessment must be passed in order to pass the module Any work which breaches the confidentiality of others will be referred.

Learning and Teaching Strategies: The module uses a blended approach to learning and teaching, including 12 hours teacher facilitated contact at Glyndwr University, supported by 24 hours online learning via Blackboard and 36 hours focused practice experience including mentoring and supervision in the workplace. Teacher facilitated hours will include lead lectures, case focused discussion and tutorials. Reflective discussion groups to enable the development of critical friends and a critically

reflective approach to accountability will be introduced within the classroom and continue as an online activity together with online theoretical support and development. An experiential, work based approach will be utilised in practice in which guided practice, observation, supervision and critical feedback from assessors will be used to enable development of the social workers critical awareness and critical reflection.
