#### **Assessment:**

Assessment 1: Essay: Students will write a critical and evaluative essay on a topic chosen from the area of concepts and theories from political philosophies with regard to welfare, including post structuralism, postmodernism and feminism.

Assessment 2: Examination: Students are required to answer questions (sight unseen) based on the topics of state/individual responsibilities (for example, issues surrounding mental health.)

Formative assessment: Feedback will be available on mock exam performance as well as on preparation for the essay.

### **Learning and Teaching Strategies:**

Teaching and learning will be accomplished via lectures, workshops, student-led tutorials and DVDs etc. All materials will be available on the VLE (Moodle) as well as additional activities and resources.

### Syllabus outline:

In this module, students will consider the philosophical and politic issues surrounding welfare provision. Students will also explore the philosophical and political ideologies that are used in any critical analysis of welfare provision .Alternative theories will be reviewed and the role of religious beliefs, social and cultural values in influencing welfare provision and its analysis will be assessed. The issues surrounding and the nature of and provision of welfare with regard to mental health will be considered alongside formal and informal societal responses to mental health.

Topics covered will include:

- Welfare what are the main problems? Needs, wants and interests.
- Utilitarianism and objective accounts of well-being. From needs to the welfare state?
- Community and communitarian justifications of the welfare state. Responsibility for welfare.



- Basic income for and against. The problem of paternalism.
- Feminist & Anti-racist approaches to Welfare.
- Particularism and Universal poststructuralism and Social Policy, the postmodern turn in welfare. Mental Health. History of, issues in, provision of services.
