#### **Module Learning Outcomes -** at the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Synthesize knowledge in relation to a subject of criminological concern to identify a rationale for further research in that area
2	Apply quantitative or qualitative research methodology and strategy to answer a specific research question
3	Collect data in a systematic and ethical manner
4	Analyse data using appropriate analytical techniques to draw conclusions in relation to a research question
5	Report on, and present research findings using approaches appropriate for the methodological approach adopted
6	Identify the implications of research findings for criminal justice policy /practice
7	Reflect on the conclusions reached; identify strength and weaknesses in the research process and the potential that exists for future research in the chosen area
