Module Aims

In this module, students will explore the evolution of social policy and the law in relation to social work practice. This module will examine how social policy and social work law have responded to social and economic change particularly in a shift from welfarism to the promotion of well-being.

The process of law and social policy formation by both central and devolved governments will be examined. Particular emphasis will be on how service user and pressure group involvement in government processes contributes to policy development.

This module will outline the changing demography and cultures of communities in which social workers will be practising and explain the nature and characteristics of skills associated with effective practice.

Learning and Teaching Strategies:

The module will use a variety of methods for teaching & learning, including lectures, group work, discussion, use of VLE for discussions, links to resources, lecture notes, etc. Service user and carer participation will be a feature, including use of materials (e.g. written accounts, DVDs, etc) and visiting speakers. Practice examples will be used in the form of case studies, drawing on students' own experience and talks/workshops delivered by social workers and social care practitioners.

Syllabus outline:

- the development of social work practice from welfare based approaches to the development of the wellbeing state
- Social policy development in the UK
- The different forms of social work provision and providers in the UK
- The historical development of Values and Ethics frameworks for social work practice
- The legal framework for provision of social work and social care services and the continuing development of integrated forms of provision.
