#### **Module Aims**

This module will enable students to understand and analyse basic social science research. It aims to introduce and develop students' understanding of the evidence base, and the agencies that generate it, for social work practice. At the core of this module are critical assessment of research methodologies, the ideas that underpin them, and the skills of analysis and argument that utilise the evaluation of competing evidence.

Students will have the opportunity to learn the development of skills in information retrieval and analysis and as the culmination of this will produce a research proposal that will link to their level 6 dissertation module. Key social work values will be apparent throughout, such as anti-oppressive agenda that guides social work research, and the Welsh context through which it should be understood.
