Module aims

Building on the theoretical base established at Level 4, this module explores the more specialist skills that may emerge from specific areas of practice in Wales and building on the wider skills that social workers need such as communication; active listening; integrating theory and knowledge and critical thinking. Students will have the opportunity to work in small groups to develop these communication skills and observing other students doing the same with a critical feedback loop. Students will identify and develop an understanding of skills including observation, assessment and direct intervention skills as required by the Social Work role. Other skills covered will be interviewing, empowerment, negotiation and working in partnership.

Finally, the students will apply practical skills such as an ability to prioritise and justify decision making and rationalising the processing they use.

Module Learning Outcomes - at the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Understand and apply a range of different theoretical perspectives of social work practice
2	Demonstrate a range of oral communication skills required for collaborative working
3	Demonstrate the critical knowledge base required to justify decision making processes
4	Outline different processes of assessment within social work practice and demonstrate how they can be undertaken
5	Demonstrate the written skills required for practice to present information accurately in a clear and structured format

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

This section outlines the type of assessment task the student will be expected to complete as part of the module. More details will be made available in the relevant academic year module handbook.

Assessment 1: The "inbox" exercise – working in groups, students will receive a series of case studies/practical tasks that they must organise into an order of priority and reach a consensus opinion about the importance of different tasks/issues.

Assessment 2: A report outlining a range of skills that could be utilised by a social worker during the assessment process.
