Module aims

This module has a focus on practical, art and craft-based approaches to coproducing knowledge alongside individuals who use services and their carers, with the aims of:

- · critically analysing the concept of social work as art
- understanding the role of creativity within social work practice
- building on knowledge of phenomenology and its central place in both personcentred and radical practice
- analysing students' own and others' creativity in relation to problem-solving and flexibility in practice
- critically analysing the use and validity of arts-based therapies within social work and related services
- building evidence-based strategies for self-care, self-expression, and self-regulation with a view to sustainability in practice

At the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Reflect on and evaluate creative methods for maintaining personal and professional wellbeing
2	Critically evaluate creative methods for problem-solving and maintaining flexibility in social work education and practice
3	Critically evaluate creative methods for establishing narratives of empowerment in social work education and practice
4	Demonstrate engagement and reliability in attendance

Learning and Teaching Strategies

The modes of study will include lectures, groupwork, participation and coproduction, discussion, tutorials, seminars, and visits. Key learning and teaching strategies are practical creative workshops introducing a variety of creative formats such as poetry, zine-making, play, painting, film, music, and dance. Individuals who use services and their carers will present art as a way of developing conversations about What Matters, showcasing methods of working which are compatible with diversities of experience. Formative assessment will be offered for a section of the reflective essay focusing on the first creative method chosen.

Indicative Syllabus Outline

Social work as art; art as social and political activism; creativity and social work methods such as poetry, collage, zine-making, dance; play; creativity and wellbeing; arts-based therapies; theories of self-care; trauma-informed practice; uncertainty, not-knowing and risk-taking; collaborative working; working with fragmentary and subversive narratives; the creative practitioner.
