## **Learning and Teaching Strategies:**

A variety of teaching and learning activities will be employed on this course, predominantly those that emphasise interactive learning and student participation. At the residential weekend these will include practical classes and workshops; case studies and problem based learning activities; class and small group discussion; simulation and group work. This module will also use the VLE to provide additional resources and learning support through forums and other interactive means of communication. Students will be required to work with the module leader and fellow students to develop their ideas for the area of study, which could include example assignment plans and reading/resources lists

Thereafter, the negotiated learning module will be supported by individual tutorials either online synchronous meetings or face to face meetings depending on the preferences of the student concerned.
