Indicative Assessment Tasks:

Students will be required to produce coursework in response to set assignments that demonstrates the student's ability in the writing, design and production of children's books.

Students will be expected to synthesise their illustrative style, creative writing skills, design fundamentals and their visual storytelling skills to create illustrated narratives that are suitable for identified genres, audiences or purposes to a professional standard. Critical self-evaluation and the organisation and presentation of material will also be assessed.

Learning and Teaching Strategies:

- Contextualising information expanding upon the methods of creation and production of picture books for children will be delivered as demonstrations and keynote lectures.
- Workshops and technical demonstrations will enable students to broaden the range of their technical ability, traditionally and digitally.
- Tutorial guidance, group critique and student seminars will form the basis of the conceptual development and understanding of the student.

Syllabus outline:

Students will be required to identify a genre, audience or purpose within the children's book industry and adapt or create an appropriate visual narrative and means of stylistic illustrative representation. They will be challenged to expand upon their ability to plan and sequence text and image in the communication of their story.

Workshops and technical demonstrations will be offered in design and publishing software, layout, composition and perspective, typography, colour, character design, media and production techniques.

Students will be required to critically self-evaluate their work for the duration of this module.
