Learning and Teaching Strategies:

This module will be introduced through a series of demonstrations, lectures and seminars. You will develop your skills and subject specific expertise through practical "hands on" exercises in studios and workshops. This will be followed up through supervised sessions, directed study with tutorial support.



Syllabus outline:

Rationale:

This module introduces you to the skills, materials and processes within specialist areas within which you can realise your own personal creative intentions. Through the investigation of specific materials and technologies, you will develop an understanding of the potential of traditional and/or contemporary fine art practice. You will also use systematic investigation to extend visual thinking and creativity. You will develop an independence of mind, and with guidance be able to develop your own lines of enquiry to progress and appreciate that practice and theory are inextricably linked.

You will have the opportunity through workshop input to explore the following areas: Painting, Printmaking, Sculpture, Glass, Drawing, Lens based media

Indicative Content:

The delivery of this module will be practical and will seek to motivate you. You will be encouraged to experiment and evaluate your own use of subject or materials specific language. Unusual materials and processes, which may extend visual thinking and creativity, should be used. You will be exposed to a range of influences, both historical and contemporary, with a particular focus on sources, concepts and approaches. You will identify modern/contemporary artists who have explored similar subject matter and will relate this to your own practice.
