Module Aims:

- To establish a framework for the discussion of aspects of practice common to all fine art subject specialism through the exploration of formal values.
- To develop the skills of observation and recording through visual research.
- To introduce a range of media and practice and creative methodologies which will enable students to develop a variety of possible outcomes from initial research material.

Intended Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this module, students will be able to:

- 1. Show an ability to confront their preconceptions about media process and format. (KS3), (KS9)
- 2. Take creative risks in the use of visual language and media. (KS2), (KS3)
- 3. Understand the characteristics, uses and functions of a range of media. (KS3), (KS6)
- 4. Build upon discoveries made. (KS2), (KS4), (KS7), (KS9)

Assessment:

Students will be assessed on their initial visual research, the testing ideas through speculative actions in materials and the application of processes and how they have resolved the relationship between form and content. These will form the basis of an ongoing dialogue. Formative assessment will feature strongly as studio based discussions of work in progress will be conducted on a frequent basis and critiques will be held toward the end of the module. Achievement will be measured on the basis of response to assignments. Staff will also seek evidence of understanding the potential of a variety of media.

A suitable submission will include a visual research journal and studio practice incorporating research and reflection as part of a developing personal studio practice.

Learning and Teaching Strategies:

This module deals with the fundamental aspects of Fine Art and encourages students to develop a broad, practical understanding of the expressive power of visual language. Its value is considered particularly relevant to subsequent practical modules, which encourage students to explore and express ideas and observations through their own chosen media and materials. An active and speculative approach will be encouraged. Students will consider the physical and expressive qualities of various media and their methods of application and at the same time, consider the relationship between form and content.

Syllabus outline:

Beginning with the Visual Research Journal, students will consolidate their knowledge of visual grammar and establish fine art "reference points" as a basis for further study.

Indicative Content:

Through lectures, skill sessions and practical demonstrations students will be introduced to the following:

- A range of strategies, practices and methodologies commonly used by artists.
- The properties of materials and processes as the means for expressive visual communication.
- Observational, analytical, expressive and subjective forms of visual language.
- Form, space, sequence, pictorial and non-pictorial representation.
