## Module aims

- 1) To introduce learners to the structure and organisation of the horse racing industry and the careers available.
- 2) To investigate how to maintain good health and welfare in racehorses.
- 3) To demonstrate key areas of handling and caring for thoroughbred horses.

Module Learning Outcomes - at the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Describe the structure of the horse racing industry and identify career opportunities available.
2	Recognise and discuss ways of maintaining good health and welfare in racehorses.
3	Demonstrate preparation of a racehorse for exercise and demonstrate and discuss specialist care afterwards.
4	Demonstrate and discuss stable management tasks specific to racing and competition yards.

## Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

### **Coursework** (Learning outcome 1)

Students will select a range of careers in the racing industry. They will reflect on their current skills and suitability for each role. They will identify gaps in their skill set for their preferred career and investigate how such skills would be achieved.

Practical (Learning outcomes 2, 3 and 4)

Students will be asked to carry out a range of practical tasks typically required by employers in the racing industry. These might include grooming, applying tack and bandages, care after exercise, monitoring health, taking temperature, pulse and respiration, preparation of horses for travelling, loading horses for travelling and putting horses onto a horse walker. Students will be assessed on their competency, efficiency in task completion, health and safety and underpinning knowledge.
