Learning and Teaching Strategies:

The learning and teaching strategy will be a series of formal lectures which describe the development, administration and enforcement of contemporary Planning and Building Control policy in the United Kingdom.

Access to policy, applications and associated documentation which remain extant in the public domain will feature throughout the delivery of the module. Such source material will form the basis of tutorials and group discussions to provide students with real-time experiences of potentially contentious aspects of the development control process.

Specialist guest speakers from the planning and building control professions will be invited to contribute to the delivery.

Site visits undertaken as part of this or other associated modules will provide appropriate vehicles for aspects of Town Planning and Building Control to be considered in site-specific contexts.

The assessment will provide an opportunity for summative feedback to help enhance and develop the student skillset required for Level 5
