Module aims

This module aims to introduce the contemporary financial management concepts and principles so as to enhance the abilities of the students to determine the most appropriate operational financial decisions, and analyse the effects of those decisions on a firm's performance and financial position. The module also aims to help students to understand the appropriateness, the advantages / shortcomings of various financial management techniques and tools and use them accordingly to maximize value.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

Learning will focus on developing the practical and academic skills necessary to make valid inferences about the role of and tools available to the finance manager. This will be achieved by means of lectures, tutorials and directed study. The lectures will cover the theory of topics and will be underpinned by the tutorials. The tutorials will be based around in-class exercises and case study discussions. Directed study will allow the students to enhance their understanding of the topics covered.

Lectures will be provided to students digitally, a minimum of three working days before the classroom tutorials. The classroom tutorials will facilitate interactive discussion and feedback on the lecture material which forms a basis for group work through practical exercises. The module is embedded within the values and practices espoused in the Glyndŵr University's Teaching and Learning and Assessment strategy whereby students are encouraged to take responsibility for their own learning and staff facilitate the learning process, with the aim of encouraging high levels of student autonomy in learning and the capacity to apply it within the wider environment.
