## **Module Aims**

The module aims to:

- 1. Explore the different models of social prescribing and their appropriate application, via a multi-disciplinary approach, to the promotion of health and wellbeing.
- 2. Allow the student to appreciate the skills required to effectively prescribe social interventions to improve wellbeing thorough:
- 3. Understanding the different types and structures of social prescribing and the theoretical models of health promotion that might underpin these.
- 4. Understanding the principles of Prudent Healthcare and co-production, especially in relation to reframing the power relationship between health and social care professionals and the communities that they serve.
- 5. Describing and assessing the different models of health and how these might influence a practitioner's approach to social prescribing.
- 6. Developing an understanding of the potential impact of economic, cultural and social factors on any social prescribing service.
- 7. Identifying examples of social prescribing services to gain an understanding of their aims and outcomes, then critiquing the success of the service in achieving these.
- 8. Considering evaluation methods that might be applied appropriately to demonstrate the effectiveness of any chosen social prescribing service, identifying the strengths and weaknesses of any such methods.
