- This module aims to provide students with a contextual overview of the evolution of the profession, paying particular importance to the local and national policies and procedures and wider cultural shifts and movements influencing the profession.
- It will aim to encourage and facilitate debates and discussions around contemporary themes and advancements in the profession and more broadly in health, education and social care sectors.
- It will give students a creative licence to showcase their knowledge and understanding in a contemporary and accessible way to develop the understanding of others.

Module Learning Outcomes - at the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Appraise the evolution of the SLT profession in the health, education, justice and social care contexts.
2	Critically evaluate the wider determinants of health and the implications for speech and language therapy practice.
3	Critically evaluate the key principles and approaches that underpin the therapeutic relationship.
4	Appraise the main models of disability in healthcare and therapeutic practice and identify the implications of these for service users.
5	Present findings in an accessible way that facilitates learning and develops the knowledge of others.

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

Formative Feedback: Students will have the opportunity to practise their presentation and higher-level communication skills prior to summative assessment.

Summative Assessment 1: Portfolio. 3000 words.

Summative Assessment 2: Students will be asked to work together in pairs or small groups. The title will be The Evolution of the Profession. Students can present this in any format including:

- Webinar
- Podcast
- Blog/vlog
- Poster

Students will be asked to present their work to a mixed panel. It will be marked as pass/fail.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

A blended learning approach will be used during the delivery of this module combining online educational materials and fade-to-face sessions. The use of the University's Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) – Moodle – allows students control over the time, place, and pace of their study. Students have a responsibility to manage and engage with the online pre- and post-session learning resources to allow them to fully comprehend the subject matter.

On campus face-to-face sessions will allow students to strengthen their learning through further discussions and tutor-led problem-based tasks and other activities. Teaching will be delivered through semester style sessions incorporating group and project work. There will be opportunities to hear from external speakers and explore CPD opportunities I.e., attending RCSLT conference, join webinars from SLT's around the globe.
