Module Aims:

This module aims to:

- Study specific texts and films from a writer's perspective and understand the conventions which shape their form and content
- Analyse the relationship between film adaptations/interpretations and their original sources, considering aspects such as pace, length, structure, perspective and setting

Intended Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this module, students will be able to:

- 1. Closely analyse selected texts/films, demonstrating detailed knowledge and understanding of character, plot, theme, structure, voice and setting (KS1)
- 2. Produce a sustained piece of literature in the crime or thriller genre, demonstrating the technical skills necessary to the selection, planning, drafting and writing the finished piece (KS3)
- 3. Critically reflect on and improve their own creative practice (KS4, KS5)
