Assessment:

The assessment for this module will consist of a 100% coursework and based on two assessments, one practical assessment weighting at 50% and one written assessment weighting at 50%.

Assessment 1 (Practical):

The ability to discuss, develop and practically experiment with innovative performance practices.

Assessment 2 (Portfolio):

Learning and Teaching Strategies:

The module will be delivered through lectures, seminar sessions and practical workshops. The module will include, where possible, theatre visits, the viewing of DVDs and web-based and written documentation of theatre and performance. Guided learning will be included to support the lecture content.

Students will have the opportunity to submit work through Turnitin/Moodle.

Syllabus outline:

- This module will introduce students to a range of texts, dramatists, practitioners and key artistic developments of the Twentieth and Twenty-first Centuries, and consider them from a global, historical, intercultural, theoretical and practical perspective.
- Each session will introduce and critically examine a specific artistic movement, text, practitioner, and their practical application towards performance and direction in theatre.



- Students will be introduced to directing practice and major directorial influences in the theatre.
- Students will develop the ability to critically analyse key artistic movements, texts and the approach of key practitioners and then apply this knowledge to practical application in the form of a directing project.
- Students will organise their own rehearsal schedules, warm-up's, casting, location and choose a suitable extract from an approved play or text. These sessions will be over seen by the tutor.
