Module Aims

The module is tailored for international students, and provides an opportunity to for students to learn about British Culture, undergraduate degree studies in UK HE and to undertake a project related to the student's future degree studies. In this process, students will enhance their academic, personal and professional skills needed for successful study at a degree level programme as appropriate for their respective subject area. In detail the aims are:

- To enable students to enhance their knowledge about a range of aspects of British culture, obtain initial information about undergraduate degree studies and undertake a project based on this experience - topic to be agreed with the supervisor
- 2) To allow students to develop and apply core study and academic skills, also in their respective future subject area, whilst they-critically select and apply methods and tools appropriate to the development of their project, from the design to the presentation stage; this will include preparation for and delivery of oral presentations, written reports and academic essays
- 3) To give students an opportunity to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of transferable and generic skills, in particular to promote collaboration, critical thinking and knowledge retention whilst also exercising their improved skills of academic English

Assessment:

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

The indicative assessment comprises the tasks as listed below with one integrated mark being submitted for assessment. Weightings identified are for indicative purposes only. Only one mark to be input onto SITS.

Element 1: oral presentation of project, using methods chosen by the students, in groups of 2-4 students, time allowance per student: 10 minutes; delivered in English (70%)

Element 2: portfolio (written overview/summary of element1, incl. resources used etc) (30%)

Learning and Teaching Strategies:

Guest lectures by colleagues from various departments will be provided – academic and operational - on a range of aspects of HE studies. Students will also follow seminars run by the Language Centre in preparation for their project, and will attend tutorials whilst their project work progresses. Students will work in groups of 2-4 and visit lectures, seminars and/or tutorials run in connection with the IFY and/or their future area of studies.

Students will be required to take notes during the lectures, and then to either summarise the lecture in writing or in a short oral presentation. This gives students exercise in listening, note-taking, summarising, and in writing or speaking. The contents of the HE related lectures will be discussed in seminars/tutorials further as necessary. This note taking exercise will support students' academic skills and be beneficial for the development of their project and future studies. Students will prepare collaborative project presentations, albeit with individual

marks for their presentations. Students will further be given an opportunity to present their findings in a written portfolio of their presentation.

Syllabus outline:

Through lectures and seminars: chosen areas and aspects of British culture.

Through lectures, seminars and/or tutorials related to the HE area: academic and study skills, knowledge and practices required for HE study; approaches and methodological issues and skills specific to the students' future academic studies; development of personal transferable and generic skills – taking into consideration the international students' specific developmental needs

Through tutorials, discussion on an agreed framework for progress on the project related to contents, appropriate tools and methods, presentation and portfolio.
