Module aims

At an overall level, this module aims to enable students to advance their knowledge and skills from a practitioner's perspective, particularly in relation to their area of postgraduate studies. Specifically, this module aims to:

- Enhance personal and professional development of students by providing opportunities to learn through work, to learn for work, and to learn at work.
- Enable students to plan and customise learning to suit their workplace requirements.



- Enable students to identify and reinforce existing knowledge and skills gained via the taught phase of their postgraduate studies, particularly for the purposes of generating new ideas to advance current practice.
- Support students in developing critical self-reflection to improve personal effectiveness as practitioners.
- Provide students scope for planning future research, learning and employment opportunities.

Module Learning Outcomes - at the end of this module, students will be able to:

1	Critically assess learning needs and create a personal development plan focused on work-based learning.
2	Critically analyse work-related information from multiple sources and evaluate emerging contradictions.
3	Demonstrate complex application of knowledge and skills, gained via the taught phase of their postgraduate studies, to activities undertaken at work placement.
4	Synthesise existing knowledge and skills, gained via the taught phase of their postgraduate studies, to generate new ideas that advance current practice.
5	Carry out critical self-reflection in terms of their self-efficacy at work and plan future research, learning and employment opportunities.

Assessment

Indicative Assessment Tasks:

This section outlines the type of assessment task the student will be expected to complete as part of the module. More details will be made available in the relevant academic year module handbook.

Students will need to submit a portfolio containing the following elements: **Element 1** (500 words / max points = 2) - Company Profile **Element 2** (500 words / max points = 2) - Comparison of Work-Based Learning and University Learning **Element 3** (500 words / max points = 2) - Learning Styles Analysis & Personal Development Plan **Element 4** (750 words / max points = 3) - Summary of Application of Existing Knowledge **Element 5** (1,250 words / max points = 5) - Critical Reflection on Work-Based Learning **Element 6** (500 words / max points = 2) - Future Learning and Employment

Each of the elements above has been given a points weighting based on the word count (250 words = 1 point).

The maximum score is 16 and the minimum score to achieve in order to get a PASS on this module is 8.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

The module offers 10 hours of scheduled learning and teaching activities. Special attention will be paid to critical self-reflection and reflective writing skills. Learning will also include interactive sessions involving student-led discussions as a means of developing critical thinking skills. In addition, students will be asked to book appointments with the university's Careers and Employability Services and take part in workshops and other events they offer. Students are expected to interact with their tutors to obtain support in terms of formative feedback and mentoring. A Work Placement Handbook will be made available in the first semester so that students can start looking for a suitable work placement at the earliest opportunity.

The AP Team will conduct several briefing sessions for ADP701 in the two semesters prior to the AP semester. Students are expected to attend all briefing sessions as attendance will count towards student engagement on the module.

Indicative Syllabus Outline

In addition to covering content directly relevant to the learning outcomes of the module, the syllabus focuses on preparing students for work placement.

Preparing for work placement:

- Overview of UK and international labour markets and employment trends
- Ways of searching and applying for work placements
- Securing work placement opportunities (including CV writing and application processes)
- Formalities to be completed with the University and the employer to organise work placement
- Assessment requirements of the module
- Working with the tutor for work placement

The content above will be made available in the form of a Work Placement Handbook in the first semester so that students can start looking for a suitable work placement opportunity as early as possible.

Other content:

- Workplace learning
- Critical and reflective thinking skills
- Critical self-reflection and self-assessment
- Reflective writing style
- Professional communication skills at workplace
- Evaluating employment opportunities
